In 1966 the Council of Associated General Contractors, Louisiana Chapter, appointed a special committee to work with NLU (later ULM) President George Walker to investigate the wisdom of creating Building Construction program here.

Dr. Walker visited a few existing programs, finding they had limited curricula and low enrollment. He advised the Council that Northeast was uniquely positioned to serve the construction industry (then the largest segment of the national economy) and the public.

The BS degree in Building Construction was approved on March 26, 1966, and

Constructor of the Year Dr. Dan Dupree

Dr. Daniel Dupree oversaw the formation of the Department Construction and hired the department head, Thurman Potts, in 1966.

Dr. Dupree attended Louisiana Tech, graduating with a BS in mathematics. After serving in the US Air Force he returned to school, earning an MS and a PhD in math from Auburn University, then becoming a professor. Later he worked for NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center for five years before moving to Monroe's NLU (ULM), where he served as department head of mathematics and then Dean of the College until his retirement in 1988. From 1989 to 2004.

Dr. Dupree was the Executive Vice President of the American Council of Construction Education (ACCE). Congratulations to Dr. Dan Dupree for being selected as a 2016 Constructor of the Year.

Distinguished Constructor Thurman Potts

Our founding director, Mr. Thurman Potts, served as a Marine in the Pacific during World War II and was awarded the Purple Heart in 1944.

He earned his bachelor's degree in architecture at Kansas State University and his master's at the University of Nebraska, after which he worked as an architect for twenty years, culminating in establishing his own firm.

In 1966 Mr. Potts began leading NLU's construction program, which became the first nationally (ACCE) accredited program in 1976.

Mr. Potts is an NLU (ULM) Professor Emeritus. He is a founding member of AIC and named the organization. The Advisory Council Industry established the Thurman Potts Endowed Professorship and program enhancement endowment in his name.

Don Beach, along with his wife Fran, has donated \$200,000 (half the needed total) toward the new School of Construction Management Entrance Hall; thus, at the 50th Anniversary celebration, ULM President Nick Bruno announced that the hall will be named the *Don Beach Entry Hall*.

But that is far from the extent of this man's involvement and influence upon the School. After getting his civil engineering degree from LSU and then working in Lafayette, he moved to Monroe, where he started Beach and Company, later named Beach Steel Erectors, Inc. While becoming the main steel erector in the northern half of the state, he also became a friend of the NLU (ULM) School of Construction.

In 1973 Beach began Steel Fabricators of Monroe, later expanding into the general contracting realm by reactivating a dormant company, Mega Corporation. Its premier project was to build the Construction Auditorium.

Don Beach then started a non-union erection firm called Ranger Erectors, Inc., as a subsidiary of Steel Fabricators of Monroe. Eventually he sold all his companies to company employees—an apt example of how he always gave back to the people that helped to make him a success.

Beach, a lifetime member of the School's Industry Advisory Council, has won numerous awards including the Kitty Degree Lifetime Business Achievement Award.

Born in Metairie, Louisiana, Favalora earned his BS in Building Construction from NLU (ULM) in 1973. Even before graduating, he worked summers as a carpenter for a local home-builder, later becoming a project engineer and then estimator/project manager. From 1981-84 he was vice president of Hammond Construction Division of Scheyd, Inc.

Becoming an entrepreneur had long been a dream of his, so in 1984 Favalora started Favalora Constructors, Inc., along with real estate development companies Favalora Properties, LLC, and Jean Lafitte Landing, LLC.

The Industry Advisory Council (IAC) has created a Strategic Plan titled "2020 Vision" that identifies objectives for 2016-2020, to enhance the Construction Management student's education and to increase enrollment. In order to achieve these goals, the IAC, along with the School of Construction Management director, believes the complex needs improvements. These are broken down into phases, based on the order of desired completion. Financial contributions are needed to bring these projects to reality. Below is an overview of the IAC projects completed and the project funds needed:

Phase I—Classroom Renovation—project completed by IAC

Four classrooms were totally renovated, including new carpeting, paint, blinds, furniture and new cooling units. New media technology, including Smart Boards, was installed.
